Eeling used to be very lucrative and many old, fat females were lost, but we have been educated to their life story and they are mostly left in peace. We have some massive ones in our back dams, and I guess when the time is right, they will make their journey. They can also go over land to get to where they need to go. Our old cat found a few that way!

Colleen also has a pool so a few of us dipped our feet in there to cool off. A very pleasant day.

Our next meeting with Deborah and Nigel in attendance will be at Pat's home just north of Masterton on Wednesday 6th March. Am sure Keith will entertain Nigel very well! We usually have a look at Keith's industrial glass blowing skills whilst we are there. So interesting.

The weather cooled down slightly but is warming back up again today. Had a few mls of rain overnight. Most schools went back last week. They can return anywhere from 28th January to 7th February, as long as they have 384 half days at school! Gives schools leeway to add days to weekends etc if they start earlier or finish later.
